A model for applying the eclectic method in a virtual English class.

This example incorporates various principles of the eclectic approach:

Topic: Environmental Issues

Objective: Students will develop language skills related to discussing and expressing opinions on environmental issues.

Warm-up

- Start with a short video clip on a current environmental issue.
- Engage students in a brief discussion using the communicative approach, encouraging them to express their initial thoughts and opinions.

Presentation

- Introduce key vocabulary related to environmental issues using a traditional audio-lingual approach.
- Share an authentic article or infographic on a specific environmental topic

Practice

- Conduct a role-playing activity where students simulate a debate on environmental policies, applying a task-based approach.
- Utilize breakout rooms for smaller group discussions, promoting individualization and collaborative learning.

Application

- Assign a project where students create a multimedia presentation (integrating technology) on a chosen environmental issue.
- Provide guidance on cultural sensitivity, encouraging students to explore global perspectives on the chosen topic.

Assessment

- Implement a brief quiz to assess understanding of key vocabulary (continuous assessment).
- Encourage peer evaluation of presentations.

- Emphasis on both form and function in language use.

View of Culture:

- Culture is an integral part of language learning.
- Encourage exploration of diverse cultural perspectives.

**What areas of language are emphasized? What language skills are emphasized?**

- Focus on all language skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing.
- Integration of vocabulary, grammar, and functional language use.

**What is the role of the students' native language?**

In the eclectic method, the students' mother tongue can be used as a tool for clarification, providing cultural context, and facilitating comparative analysis.

**How is evaluation accomplished?**

-Ongoing and varied assessments, including quizzes, projects, and peer evaluations.

**The techniques of the eclectic method**
